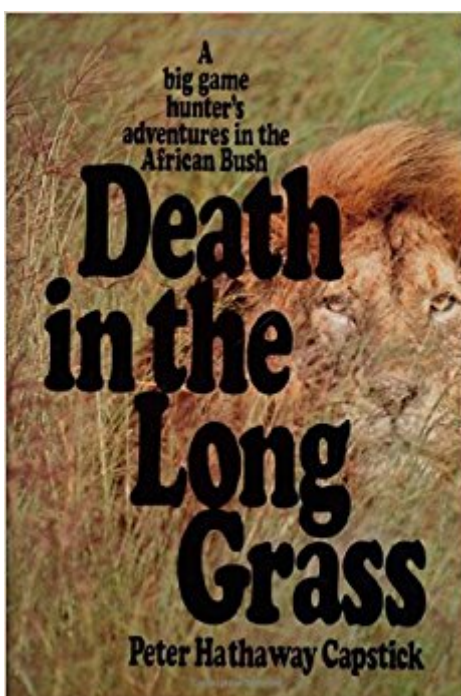

Death In The Long Grass: A Big Game Hunter's Adventures In The African Bush



Synopsis

Few men can say they have known Africa as Peter Hathaway Capstick has known it-- leading safaris through lion country; tracking man-eating leopards along tangled jungle paths; running for cover as fear-maddened elephants stampede in all directions. And of the few who have known this dangerous way of life, fewer still can recount their adventures with the flair of this former professional hunter-turned-writer. Based on Capstick's own experiences and the personal accounts of his colleagues, *Death in the Long Grass* portrays the great killers of the African bush-- not only the lion, leopard, and elephant, but the primitive rhino and the crocodile waiting for its unsuspecting prey, the titanic hippo and the Cape buffalo charging like an express train out of control. Capstick was a born raconteur whose colorful descriptions and eye for exciting, authentic detail bring us face to face with some of the most ferocious killers in the world-- underrated killers like the surprisingly brave and cunning hyena, silent killers such as the lightning-fast black mamba snake, collective killers like the wild dog. Readers can lean back in a chair, sip a tall, iced drink, and revel in the kinds of hunting stories Hemingway and Ruark used to hear in hotel bars from Nairobi to Johannesburg, as veteran hunters would tell of what they heard beyond the campfire and saw through the sights of an express rifle. As thrilling as any novel, as taut and exciting as any adventure story, *Death in the Long Grass* takes us deep into the heart of darkness to view the Africa that few people have ever seen.

This book is yet another of Capstick's insights into the life of a Bwana (African Hunting Guide). With the help of his Black African (Masai) Assistants, (Silent and Deadly --Yup! That's their names) Capstick faces the big five of African Man-Killers, Leopard, Cape Buffalo, Lion, Hippo, and Elephants. I never knew that Elephants would do their best to kill people. Yikes! Yes, Peter Hathaway Capstick is his real name, and what a great name for a White Hunter !!! Mr.

Capstick was a professional hunter, both for the government and privately (i.e., he lead safaris) in Africa in the 1970s. I remember reading his articles in Outdoor Life back then, thrilling as I read about how he put his life on the line to track a wounded man-eating lion that had just devoured some poor native. When I stumbled across this book recently, I immediately ordered it, and I was not disappointed. Despite slinging words the way William Shatner chews scenery (almost to the point of being comical at times), his stories of real-life death in the long grass are fascinating and engaging. When he tells us about how he was knocked down and straddled by a leopard that had just slaughtered a family of six (he says the leopard is the only animal in Africa that kills people for fun), I thought "oh boy how is he gonna get out of this ?". Thank goodness for his head tracker Silent, who poked the barrel of his ancient shotgun into the kitty's ear and pulled both triggers. Yes, it's *that* kind of book. Capstick starts with a chapter on each of the African Big 5, and then adds chapters on the many other animals there that can and will kill you if they get a chance. Like the hippo, who he says kills more natives each year than the Big 5 combined. Or the hyena, a pack of which can and will force a lion off its kill.

I enjoy Capstick and have enjoyed reading this book more than once. I am not sure that, were it written today, it would be published. One of the real values in Capstick's writing is that he understands and writes well about the history of Africa and its hunting life, but can see the changes coming. He tries to weigh the value and difficulties of the old methods of hunting and the new and changing cultural associations with nature, hunting and man's place in the environment. He made a conscious choice as a young man to leave the US and live and work in the most undeveloped place he could find. His experiences and his ability to describe them are entertaining and thought provoking.

This is one of my favorite books of all time, I love retelling these stories to friends--they are always very entertained by the different ways an elephant can kill a man! Or how many people a single lion can eat, or how many vultures a crocodile can still kill with half of its brain blown apart, or how cunning and deadly a leopard can be even against the most hardened veteran hunters. I couldn't put this book down, start to finish.

I really liked *Death in the Long Grass*. It was well-written and easy to read. I really could imagine myself being on safari with the author. I think the stories are still timely, well told, captivating and engrossing. My favorite chapter was the one about hunting leopards, which I found very interesting

and compelling. I gave *Death in the Long Grass* five stars because I found it to be very enjoyable and informative. Who cares if Capstick had a big ego? I didn't. Most successful people in life do. He was very good at what he did as a big game hunter in Africa for that period of time and he lived to move on to something else afterwards. The only negative in *Death in the Long Grass* is the author's diatribe against the conservationists and the politics involved, which I did not hold against him.

Even though this book has been available for about 40 years, it is still as intriguing and hard to put down as anything I have ever read. Capstick has had more experience in the African bush than most wildlife writers and his descriptions of his encounters are terrifying and heart stopping narratives with a healthy dose of respect for the animals and humor at the outrageous predicaments that can only be born of disastrous situations. What a great read!

One animal per chapter. Author goes into fascinating detail on each. Both terrifying and hysterical anecdotes during his years as a Professional Hunter (PH) and guide. Even non-hunters will like this for the detail. It's rather surprising which animal he rates as most dangerous. If you want to escape to an African big game camp and join a pH, begin at page 1.
