

You can dip in to the book or read it cover to cover, but in the main this book is intended to be one that you go back to again and again when you need a reminder that you are not alone when things get tough or it feels like things are not going your way. Use it as a little bible of thought-provoking lessons to help you determine what you can do in your own business. Lessons include "Be conscious of the business you are creating. If you consciously give things away, work cheaply or do freebies, guess what you'll be known for!" and "The difficult customers you get â “ and you WILL get difficult customers - are an opportunity to learn. Itâ™s tough to turn a bad experience into a well-timed lesson, but youâ™ll thank the client later." Many people have describe this book as inspirational as it touched them just at the point where they needed a reminder that they are not alone as a photographer in business, even though at times it can feel a very lonely career, whether you do it full time or alongside your job. This is not a book of answers â “ itâ™s a book of lessons so that you can learn from the mistakes of others, and begin to question where you can change your business to become more successful.
